Corporate Social Responsibility



In 2014, India became the first country in the world to mandate CSR spend through legislative action. The legal mandate on CSR applies to companies that have :

- a. Net worth of INR 500 Crore or more, OR
- b. Annual turnover of INR 1000 Crore or more, OR
- c. Net profit of INR 5 Crore or more.

Companies thus coming under the CSR mandate, have to spend at least 2% of their average net profits of the preceding three years on social impact programmes in every financial year.

In the first 3 years of implementation of this law, over 29000 companies have come under the CSR ambit. Cumulatively they have spent over INR 41,396 Crore over a period of 3 years.

In this report, we have analysed the cumulative 3-year CSR spend by the entire set of companies (total of 29190) on sector-wise trends using the data made available by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs as of January 2019.




Number of Companies, Prescribed and Spent Amounts Per CSR Budget Range

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Sector-wise CSR trends



Education is the most popular choice of sector for CSR projects receiving 25% of the total CSR - more than 10,000 Crore - between 2014-2017. In fact education alone received as much funding as the next 2 sectors – healthcare and rural development – combined!

Top 3 sectors comprising of education, healthcare and rural development together received 50% of the total CSR fund. Remaining 50% is spread over 25 different sectors.

Major sectors where CSR spending has **grown** each year include:

- Education
- Rural development
- Livelihood enhancement
- Vocational skills
- Environmental sustainability (highest increase)


Major sectors where CSR spending has been **declining** over the years include:

- Poverty, eradicating hunger and malnutrition (sharpest decline)
- Sanitation
- Safe drinking water
- Swachh Bharat Kosh
- Prime Minister's National Relief Fund





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
CSR (INR Crores) spend on Rural Development Projects - (2014-17)







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
CSR (INR Crores) spend on **Environmental Sustainability** - (2014-17)





CSR (INR Crores) spend on Poverty, Eradicating Hunger, Malnutrition - (2014-17)






CSR (INR Crores) spend on Sanitation - (2014-17)








CSR (INR Crores) spend on Livelihood Enhancement Projects - (2014-17)









CSR (INR Crores) spend on Other Central Government Funds - (2014-17)









CSR (INR Crores) spend on Vocational Skills - (2014-17)






CSR (INR Crores) spend on Swachh Bharat Kosh - (2014-17)








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
CSR (INR Crores) spend on Prime Ministers National Relief Fund - (2014-17)






CSR (INR Crores) spend on Safe Drinking Water - (2014-17)



- Data is as made available by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs as of January 2019.
- The data for FY 2016-17 is not fully updated on MCA portal (as of Jan '19), and hence the CSR spend figures may go up once the data is complete.
- An updated report will be available in June 2019 on sattva.co.in and IndiaDataInsights.com.
- The industry mapping as codified in the CIN is not fully accurate in many cases and hence we have re-classified the top CSR spenders into categories as analysed in this report. The re-mapping of industry type ensures that about 80%-90% of the total CSR spend is mapped to the right industry. For remaining 28000+ companies, we have retained the mapping as per their CIN, and hence that may lead to a small margin of error in industry-wise CSR spend calculation. However the error is small and is unlikely to impact the overall picture of industry-wise CSR spending trends portrayed here. Designing effective and high-impact CSR programmes



What can help companies define their CSR strategy and focus area effectively?

We believe that data can work as a great guide in identifying the right needs and interventions.

In our earlier report <u>here</u>, we had reported that the per capita (for people below poverty line) CSR spend was highest for the Western and Southern regions where average per capita incomes are the highest too. The regions with higher poverty and lower per capita incomes – Central and East - receive the lowest proportion of CSR.

In case of sectors, the sharpest decline in CSR spend over the years has been on 'Poverty, eradicating hunger and malnutrition' (see here). India is ranked 103 on global hunger index. According to NFHS-4 (2015-16), 53% women in reproductive age group and 58% children under 5 are anemic. 38% children under 5 are chronically undernourished (stunted growth), 21% have acute undernourishment (wasted children). The following page shows the magnitude of hunger and malnutrition in India.


